- (c) who believe that in this sacrament the real body and blood of Christ are truly distributed to them and orally received by them, bestowing on them the forgiveness of sins, life and salvation;

(d) who **sincerely repent** of all their sins, and desire to receive God's forgiveness in this holy meal. Guests at our services, before receiving the sacrament, are requested to affirm these facts with one of our pastors. Thank you for honoring our practice. If you are looking for a church home, would like to be a member of Zion, or would like to learn more about the Christian Faith, please speak to one of our pastors about our membership classes.

Readings for the Last Sunday of the Church Year

The Old Testament Reading is Ezekiel 34:11-16, 20-24

"For thus says the Lord GOD: Behold, I, I myself will search for my sheep and will seek them out. As a shepherd seeks out his flock when he is among his sheep that have been scattered, so will I seek out my sheep, and I will rescue them from all places where they have been scattered on a day of clouds and thick darkness. And I will bring them out from the peoples and gather them from the countries, and will bring them into their own land. And I will feed them on the mountains of Israel, by the ravines, and in all the inhabited places of the country. I will feed them with good pasture, and on the mountain heights of Israel shall be their grazing land. There they shall lie down in good grazing land, and on rich pasture they shall feed on the mountains of Israel. I myself will be the shepherd of my sheep, and I myself will make them lie down, declares the Lord GOD. I will seek the lost, and I will bring back the strayed, and I will bind up the injured, and I will strengthen the weak, and the fat and the strong I will destroy. I will feed them in justice. ...

"Therefore, thus says the Lord GOD to them: Behold, I, I myself will judge between the fat sheep and the lean sheep. Because you push with side and shoulder, and thrust at all the weak with your horns, till you have scattered them abroad, I will rescue my flock; they shall no longer be a prey. And I will judge between sheep and sheep. And I will set up over them one shepherd, my servant David, and he shall feed them: he shall feed them and be their shepherd. And I, the LORD, will be their God, and my servant David shall be prince among them. I am the LORD; I have spoken."

The Epistle is 1 Corinthians 15:20-28

But in fact Christ has been raised from the dead, the firstfruits of those who have fallen asleep. For as by a man came death, by a man has come also the resurrection of the dead. For as in Adam all die, so also in Christ shall all be made alive. But each in his own order: Christ the firstfruits, then at his coming those who belong to Christ. Then comes the end, when he delivers the kingdom to God the Father after destroying every rule and every authority and power. For he must reign until he has put all his enemies under his feet. The last enemy to be destroyed is death. For "God has put all things in subjection under his feet." But when it says, "all things are put in subjection," it is plain that he is excepted who put all things in subjection under him. When all things are subjected to him, then the Son himself will also be subjected to him who put all things in subjection under him, that God may be all in all.

The Gospel is Matthew 25:31-46

[Jesus said,] "When the Son of Man comes in his glory, and all the angels with him, then he will sit on his glorious throne. Before him will be gathered all the nations, and he will separate people one from another as a shepherd separates the sheep from the goats. And he will place the sheep on his right, but the goats on the left. Then the King will say to those on his right, 'Come, you who are blessed by my Father, inherit the kingdom prepared for you from the foundation of the world. For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, I was a stranger and you welcomed me, I was naked and you clothed me, I was sick and you visited me, I was in prison and you came to me.' Then the righteous will answer him, saying, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you, or thirsty and give you drink? And when did we see you a stranger and welcome you, or naked and clothe you? And when did we see you sick or in prison and visit you?' And the King will answer them, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did it to one of the least of these my brothers, you did it to me.'

"Then he will say to those on his left, 'Depart from me, you cursed, into the eternal fire prepared for the devil and his angels. For I was hungry and you gave me no food, I was thirsty and you gave me no drink, I was a stranger and you did not welcome me, naked and you did not clothe me, sick and in prison and you did not visit me.' Then they also will answer, saying, 'Lord, when did we see you hungry or thirsty or a stranger or naked or sick or in prison, and did not minister to you?' Then he will answer them, saying, 'Truly, I say to you, as you did not do it to one of the least of these, you did not do it to me.' And these will go away into eternal punishment, but the righteous into eternal life."

What Doctor Luther Says:

Like Christ We Shall Be Raised a Spiritual Body Through His suffering Christ was taken from the life which is flesh and blood just like a human being on earth, who lives in flesh and blood, walks and stands, eats, drinks, sleeps, is awake, sees, hears, touches and feels, and, in short, does what the body does. This is transitory. To it Christ died. St. Paul calls it the *corpus animale*, the "physical body" (1 Cor. 15:44), that is, life like that of an animal. In the flesh, not according to the flesh, that is, in the natural functions of the body. To this life he has died, so that this life has ceased with Him, and He has now been transferred into a nother life, has been made alive according to the spirit, and has entered into a spiritual and supernatural life which embraces the whole life that Christ now has in body and soul. Consequently, He no longer has a physical body but has a body that is spiritual. ...

This is how St. Paul speaks about the subject in 1 Cor. 15:45: "The first man Adam became a living being; the last Adam became a life-giving spirit." And he adds: "Just as we have borne the image of the natural man, so we shall also bear the image of the spiritual man (cf. v. 49). From Adam we, like irrational animals, have inherited all the natural functions according to the five senses. But Christ is spiritual flesh and blood, not according to the external senses. He does not sleep and does not wake. Yet He knows everything and is everywhere. This is how we, too, shall be. He is the First Fruits, the Beginning, and the First-born of the spiritual life, as St. Paul says (1 Cor. 15:20, Col. 1:18); that is, He is the first who rose and entered into a spiritual life. Thus Christ now lives according to the spirit; that is, He is true man, but He has a spiritual body. Therefore here the words should not be referred to the way spirit and flesh are differentiated. No, they mean that the body and the flesh are spiritual and that the spirit is in the body and with the body.

Zion Stay-Safe Protocols

- Holy Communion will continue with stations until the virus is contained. Individual cups are offered for the blood of Christ.

 - The Congregational Assembly shall consist of the collective body of "Assembly Members" as defined in the Bylaws.
 - Under the authority of God's Word and in accordance with ٠ the Confessional Standard of Article III, the Congregational Assembly shall have operative authority over the internal and external administration and management of all congregational business; its operative authority shall usually be exercised through the Council of Elders (Article IX.A) the Administrative Council (Article IX. B) and the Education Council (Article IX.C). Any congregational member may appeal to the Congregational Assembly in any matter relating to the government of the congregation (see Bylaws) and the decision of the Congregational Assembly shall be final and binding. The congregation, through its Assembly and Councils, shall never be empowered to decide anything contrary to the Word of God and the Confessions of the Evangelical Lutheran Church (Article III) and any such decision shall be null and void. The right of calling pastors and professional church workers shall be vested in the Congregational Assembly and shall not be delegated to a smaller group or to an individual.
