- (b) who have been instructed in the truth of Holy Scripture as taught in the Lutheran Confessions, who have been confirmed in this Lutheran faith, and who now confess the same doctrines that are taught in this congregation, holding membership in a congregation of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod;
- (c) who believe that in this sacrament the real body and blood of Christ are truly distributed to them and orally received by them, bestowing on them the forgiveness of sins, life and salvation;
- (d) who sincerely repent of all their sins, and desire to receive God's forgiveness in this holy meal.

Guests at our services, before receiving the sacrament, are requested to affirm these facts with one of our pastors. Thank you for honoring our practice. If you are looking for a church home, would like to be a member of Zion, or would like to learn more about the Christian Faith, please speak to one of our pastors about our membership classes.

Readings for Easter Sunday, The Festival of the Resurrection of Our Lord

The Old Testament Reading is Isaiah 25:6-9

On this mountain the LORD of hosts will make for all peoples a feast of rich food, a feast of well-aged wine, of rich food full of marrow, of aged wine well refined.
And he will swallow up on this mountain the covering that is cast over all peoples, the veil that is spread over all nations. He will swallow up death forever;
and the Lord GOD will wipe away tears from all faces, and the reproach of his people he will take away from all the earth, for the LORD has spoken.
It will be said on that day, "Behold, this is our God; we have waited for him, that he might save us.

This is the LORD; we have waited for him;

let us be glad and rejoice in his salvation."

The Epistle is 1 Corinthians 15:1-11

Now I would remind you, brothers, of the gospel I preached to you, which you received, in which you stand, and by which you are being saved, if you hold fast to the word I preached to you— unless you believed in vain.

For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have fallen asleep. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unworthy to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me was not in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them, though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. Whether then it was I or they, so we preach and so you believed.

The Gospel is St. Mark 16:1-8

After the Sabbath had passed, Mary Magdalene, Mary the Mother of James, and Salome, bought spices, in order that they might go and anoint him. And very early in the morning, on the first day of the week, they come to the tomb—after the sun had risen. And they began to say to themselves, "Who will roll away for us the stone from the door of the tomb?" And upon looking up, they see that the stone is rolled away! It was a big one, you know?

And upon entering the tomb, they saw a young man sitting at the right side, clothed in a white garment, and they became alarmed. And he says to them, "Don't be alarmed! You seek Jesus of Nazareth, the one who is crucified. He has arisen! He is not here! Look—the place where they laid him. But go, tell his disciples—even Peter—he is going before you into Galilee. There you will see him, just as he told you!"

And upon going out, they fled from the tomb. For trembling and astonishment had them in its grip. And they said nothing to anyone. They were afraid, you know?





SPRING CLEANING Longer days and warmer weather mean it's almost time for Zion's spring clean-up. This year's event will be Saturday, April 24, from 9 a.m. to noon. PARENTS WITH LITTLE ONES, there are booster seats available for you in the old narthex (entryway). Ask or pick one up for your toddler to help them sit and see.

MEN OF ZION are studying the prophet Zechariah. Join in on Wednesday mornings at 9:30 AM.

COVID PROTOCOLS for Zion will not loosen up any more for a while. Allen County's metrics don't warrant it. Check our posted protocols, if you're unsure of them. Remember: transmission of COVID is primarily by breathing in respiratory droplets. Thus we are still urging masks in the pews for the sake of the unvaccinated, and we still are promoting good hand hygiene. Inching toward normal.

COVID-19 UPDATE AT ZION: Allen County remains in yellow with the same twomeasure metric of 1.5. Again, don't expect that to change for at least another week. All of our daily positivity rates have been at or above 5%. The 7-day rate is not going down soon. Thanks be to God, our hospital capacity still looks good. The CDC is still urging mask wearing when in public. Please get vaccinated, if you can. *Hoosiers 16 and older are now eligible*. Allen County is generally administering 2,000 doses a day. We're lagging behind the state in getting shots in arms. The state says 20.8% have been fully vaccinated; Allen County is at 14.5%. Let's do our part.

MEMORY VERSE CHALLENGE How did you do on last week's challenge verse? This week's memory verses focuses on the purpose of both cross and resurrection — our justification: Romans 4:24-25 "It [righteousness] will be counted to us who believe in him who raised from the dead Jesus our Lord, who was delivered up for our trespasses and raised for our justification." Last week's verse was 2 Corinthians 5:21.

What Doctor Luther Says:

About Looking to the Living Christ for Courage Recently our faith was put to a still harder test. Satan, who always mingles with the children of God [Job 1:6], has made fine sport of us, mainly of me, in Wittenberg. He has permitted our adversaries to indulge their hatred against us. He opened his mouth wide to vilify the gospel. All my foes, including all devils, no matter how viciously they (often) attacked me, have never hit me as hard as our own people did now. I must confess that the smoke sorely smarts my eyes and makes me heartsick. Here, the devil thought, "I will depress Luther's courage and break his strong spirit. He will neither understand nor overcome what is done."

Alas, I ask myself if this is not happening in punishment of some of my chief patrons and of me. Of my patrons, because, though they believe that Christ is risen, they still wander about in the Garden [looking] for him along with Magdalene, and he has not yet ascended to the Father for them [John 20:17]. Of me, because, as a concession to good friends, I was so subdued at Worms lest I appear stubborn, and so did not make a more explicit and a bolder confession before the tyrants, although since that time these unbelieving heathen have accused me of replying arrogantly. They judge as heathen (that is what they are), who have never sensed a bit of the spirit of faith. I have often regretted my humility and deference.

But be that as it may, whether we sinned or did right, we must for all of that be undaunted and unafraid. For just as we do not boast of our good deeds, neither do we despond in our sins. Rather do we thank God that our faith transcends both good deeds and sins. For the Father of all mercy has granted us faith, not in a wooden but in a living Christ, who is Lord over sin and over innocence, who can support and preserve us even if we fell into many thousands of sins every hour. Of this I have not the slightest doubt. *Luther's Works*, 8:257-8.



Zion Stay-Safe Protocols

- Allen County metrics turned upward reminding us that COVID-19 is still active. Vaccines are available for Hoosiers 40 and older and soon for all Hoosiers 16 and older. We encourage you – be vaccinated!
