RECEIVING OF THE LORD'S SUPPER AT ZION



- (b) who have been instructed in the truth of Holy Scripture as taught in the Lutheran Confessions, who have been confirmed in this Lutheran faith, and who now confess the same doctrines that are taught in this congregation, holding membership in a congregation of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod;
- (c) who believe that in this sacrament the real body and blood of Christ are truly distributed to them and orally received by them, bestowing on them the forgiveness of sins, life and salvation:
- (d) who **sincerely repent** of all their sins, and desire to receive God's forgiveness in this holy meal. Guests at our services, before receiving the sacrament, are requested to affirm these facts with one of our pastors. Thank you for honoring our practice. If you are looking for a church home, would like to be a member of Zion, or would like to learn more about the Christian Faith, please speak to one of our pastors about our membership classes.



Readings for the Fifth Sunday after the Epiphany

The Old Testament Reading is Isaiah 6:1-13

In the year that King Uzziah died I saw the Lord sitting upon a throne, high and lifted up; and the train of his robe filled the temple. Above him stood the seraphim. Each had six wings: with two he covered his face, and with two he covered his feet, and with two he flew. And one called to another and said:

"Holy, holy, holy is the LORD of hosts; the whole earth is full of his glory!"

And the foundations of the thresholds shook at the voice of him who called, and the house was filled with smoke. And I said: "Woe is me! For I am lost; for I am a man of unclean lips, and I dwell in the midst of a people of unclean lips; for my eyes have seen the King, the LORD of hosts!"

Then one of the seraphim flew to me, having in his hand a burning coal that he had taken with tongs from the altar. And he touched my mouth and said: "Behold, this has touched your lips; your guilt is taken away, and your sin atoned for."

And I heard the voice of the Lord saying, "Whom shall I send, and who will go for us?" Then I said, "Here I am! Send me." And he said, "Go, and say to this people:

"Keep on hearing, but do not understand;

keep on seeing, but do not perceive.'

Make the heart of this people dull,

and their ears heavy, and blind their eyes;

lest they see with their eyes,

and hear with their ears,

and understand with their hearts,

and turn and be healed."

Then I said, "How long, O Lord?"

And he said: "Until cities lie waste without inhabitant,

and houses without people,

and the land is a desolate waste,

and the LORD removes people far away,

and the forsaken places are many in the midst of the land.

And though a tenth remain in it, it will be burned again,

like a terebinth or an oak,

whose stump remains when it is felled."

The holy seed is its stump.

The Epistle is 1 Corinthians 14:12b-20

Since you are eager for manifestations of the Spirit, strive to excel in building up the church.

Therefore, one who speaks in a tongue should pray for the power to interpret. For if I pray in a tongue, my spirit prays but my mind is unfruitful. What am I to do? I will pray with my spirit, but I will pray with my mind also; I will sing praise with my spirit, but I will sing with my mind also. Otherwise, if you give thanks with your spirit, how can anyone in the position of an outsider say "Amen" to your thanksgiving when he does not know what you are saying? For you may be giving thanks well enough, but the other person is not being built up. I thank God that I speak in tongues more than all of you. Nevertheless, in church I would rather speak five words with my mind in order to instruct others, than ten thousand words in a tongue.

Brothers, do not be children in your thinking. Be infants in evil, but in your thinking be mature.

The Gospel is Luke 5:1-11

On one occasion, while the crowd was pressing in on [Jesus] to hear the word of God, he was standing by the lake of Gennesaret, and he saw two boats by the lake, but the fishermen had gone out of them and were washing their nets. Getting into one of the boats, which was Simon's, he asked him to put out a little from the land. And he sat down and taught the people from the boat. And when he had finished speaking, he said to Simon, "Put out into the deep and let down your nets for a catch." And Simon answered, "Master, we toiled all night and took nothing! But at your word I will let down the nets." And when they had done this, they enclosed a large number of fish, and their nets were breaking. They signaled to their partners in the other boat to come and help them. And they came and filled both the boats, so that they began to sink. But when Simon Peter saw it, he fell down at Jesus' knees, saying, "Depart from me, for I am a sinful man, O Lord." For he and all who were with him were astonished at the catch of fish that they had taken, and so also were James and John, sons of Zebedee, who were partners with Simon. And Jesus said to Simon, "Do not be afraid; from now on you will be catching men." And when they had brought their boats to land, they left everything and followed him.

COVID-19 UPDATE AT ZION: Please read this update if you want information on COVID. I'm not making oral comments regarding COVID unless some protocol needs changing. We're still red in Allen County this week; I expect the whole state will be also. The slowing of the spread of Omicron is happening. The Seven-Day Positivity Rate is going down; it was reported as 28.7% today. The Weekly Cases per 100,000 Residents has similarly gone down to about 1,000 (from a high of almost 1,900 a month ago). Omicron remains the predominant variant, accounting for 98.04% of the cases in the week of 1/10/2022, but thankfully it is not so deadly. District 3 hospitalizations and ICU bed due to COVID have both come down; average deaths due to COVID is 2 today and hopefully coming down, too. Omicron does seem to slip by the vaccine protections more easily, and the breakthrough cases reflect that. Breakthrough infections, hospitalizations, and deaths are now 7.947%, 0.079%, and 0.044%, respectively. I still encourage vaccinations if you haven't been and can. They may not stop the infection, but they do help reduce symptoms and forestall hospitalization. Visit www.coronavirus.in.gov/vaccine/ for your eligibility and to schedule your vaccine or booster.

What Doctor Luther Says:

About Distrust as the Source of Fear

If anyone is snatched away by death before he has attained that perfect love which drives out fear, he necessarily dies in fear and trembling until love is perfected and able to cast out fear. This fear which I mention is that conscience which is evil and disturbed because of a weak point in faith. As the Apostle says, the blood of Christ frees our consciences from dead works [Heb. 9:14]. And also in Heb. 10 [:22] we read, "Our hearts are sprinkled clean from an evil conscience in the full assurance of faith."

Briefly, if I can prove that the reason for dread and fear is distrust, and that the reason for assurance, on the other hand, is faith, I believe it has been proved at the same time that the person who dies with an imperfect faith necessarily fears and trembles. Furthermore, distrust is often referred to in the gospel as the reason for terror, despair, and condemnation. In the first place this becomes clear on the occasion when Peter commanded the Lord to depart from him, saying, "for I am a sinful man" [Luke 5:8]. The second case in point is given when Peter began to sink because of his little faith [Matt. 14:30]. A third instance is referred to when the disciples wanted to cry out in dismay when they thought Christ was a ghost walking on the sea [Matt. 14:26]. And a fourth occurrence is referred to when the distraught disciples thought they saw a spirit as Christ entered their midst through the closed doors [Luke 24:37]. In all these cases distrust is portrayed as the reason for fear and dread. Therefore all fear and trembling arises from distrust, every feeling of assurance arises from faith in God. Faith, however, arises out of love, since the person must be like the one in whom he puts his trust.


We thank God for the opportunity to provide excellent academic preparation for the children we serve. We are most grateful for the opportunity to share Jesus' amazing love with children and their families.
