RECEIVING OF THE LORD'S SUPPER AT ZION

As intended by Christ and as practiced by the one, holy, catholic and apostolic church throughout her history, "Closed Communion" is observed in this congregation, in which the Lord's Supper is distributed only to those: (a) who have been **baptized** in the Name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit;

- (b) who have been **instructed** in the truth of Holy Scripture as taught in the Lutheran Confessions, who have been **confirmed** in this Lutheran faith, and who now confess the same doctrines that are taught in this congregation, holding membership in a congregation of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod;
- (c) who believe that in this sacrament the real body and blood of Christ are truly distributed to them and orally received by them, bestowing on them the forgiveness of sins, life and salvation;

(d) who **sincerely repent** of all their sins, and desire to receive God's forgiveness in this holy meal. Guests at our services, before receiving the sacrament, are requested to affirm these facts with one of our pastors. Thank you for honoring our practice. The LORD spoke to Moses, saying, "Speak to Aaron and his sons, saying, Thus you shall bless the people of Israel: you shall say to them,

Now before faith came, we were held captive under the law, imprisoned until the coming faith would be revealed. What Doctor Luther Says:

About Sign and Promise in Circumcision and Baptism

"The sign and the promise should be tied to each other, not torn from each other. Those err who abandon the sign and say, 'God is the God of all nations and therefore I won't allow myself to be baptized.' For the promise always stands in such a way that the letter and the seal should be together. Neither avails without the other. One doesn't have faith in a seal which stands by itself, nor in a letter by itself. ... If you have the letter, let a seal be affixed to it. It would have availed nothing if a Jew had said, 'I am Abraham's son and therefore I don't want to be circumcised.'

"Because the objection is now raised that the day of circumcision was fixed namely, the eighth day—but the time of baptism was not fixed, I reply: I'm not concerned about the work but about the Word. The eighth day adds nothing. Nor does either the command or the sign add anything, for Abraham was righteous before the circumcision. Learn to hold the Word high. It's true that circumcision was a command, a requirement, and was prescribed for the eighth day, but you should say, 'This day or that day, this command or that command—these aren't the important things. This is of central importance: that God is your God and the God of your seed. It's on the strength of this promise that you should be circumcised.' Even so, it doesn't matter whether one is baptized when young or old, but it matters that God is the God of young and old and that he gave his Son for them. It's on this that you should be baptized."

Luther's Works, 54:56-7.

Now after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea in the days of Herod the king, behold, wise men from the east came to Jerusalem, saying, "Where is he who has been born king of the Jews? For we saw his star when it rose and have come to worship him." Matthew 2:1-2.

In the church year, the coming of the wise men to the one born king of the Jews is not part of the Christmas narrative. It's associated with the Epiphany of our Lord. Nevertheless, our nativity scenes generally include the "three kings" bringing their gifts to the infant lying in a manger. They telescope this event associated with the birth narrative into the tableau.

That's fine with me. It reminds me of today. Nearly two years after its advent, everything is still being interpreted in the shadow of COVID. Fear still grips many people, including some of us. Unlike the wise men, Luther would urge us to "follow the Scriptures and not our own murky ideas," whether common sense, or that offered by experts. Have faith — trust Jesus.

Luther wrote, "When the Wise Men received the divine revelation that the king of the Jews was born, they made straight for Jerusalem, for, of course, they expected to find him at the capital in a lordly castle and a golden chamber. Where else would common sense expect to find a king? But because they were so sure of themselves, the star left them. Then they were sorely tried, and had they relied solely on human wisdom, would surely have said: "Confound it! We have come all this way for nothing. The star has deceived us. The devil has led us by an apparition. If a king had been born, would he not be in the capital and in a palace? But when we come, the star disappears and we find no one who knows anything about him. ... What a miserable king we are seeking! What fools we have been to let ourselves start on this quest!" Nature wants to feel and be certain before believing, but grace will believe before she feels. Faith steps gaily into the darkness, trusting simply in the Word." From *Martin Luther's Christmas Book*, edited by Roland H. Bainton, p. 50-51.

May the Word be our guide. May we step forward into the new year in faith, trusting our Savior and His loving care for us, trusting in our salvation.
