Readings for Matins—Easter Sunrise

The First Reading is Exodus 14:10–15:1

When Pharaoh drew near, the people of Israel lifted up their eyes, and behold, the Egyptians were marching after them, and they feared greatly. And the people of Israel cried out to the LORD. They said to Moses, "Is it because there are no graves in Egypt that you have taken us away to die in the wilderness? What have you done to us in bringing us out of Egypt? Is not this what we said to you in Egypt: 'Leave us alone that we may serve the Egyptians'? For it would have been better for us to serve the Egyptians than to die in the wilderness." And Moses said to the people, "Fear not, stand firm, and see the salvation of the LORD, which he will work for you today. For the Egyptians whom you see today, you shall never see again. The LORD will fight for you, and you have only to be silent."

The LORD said to Moses, "Why do you cry to me? Tell the people of Israel to go forward. Lift up your staff, and stretch out your hand over the sea and divide it, that the people of Israel may go through the sea on dry ground. And I will harden the hearts of the Egyptians so that they shall go in after them, and I will get glory over Pharaoh and all his host, his chariots, and his horsemen. And the Egyptians shall know that I am the LORD, when I have gotten glory over Pharaoh, his chariots, and his horsemen."

Then the angel of God who was going before the host of Israel moved and went behind them, and the pillar of cloud moved from before them and stood behind them, coming between the host of Egypt and the host of Israel. And there was the cloud and the darkness. And it lit up the night without one coming near the other all night.

Then Moses stretched out his hand over the sea, and the LORD drove the sea back by a strong east wind all night and made the sea dry land, and the waters were divided. And the people of Israel went into the midst of the sea on dry ground, the waters being a wall to them on their right hand and on their left. The Egyptians pursued and went in after them into the midst of the sea, all Pharaoh's horses, his chariots, and his horsemen. And in the morning watch the LORD in the pillar of fire and of cloud looked down on the Egyptian forces and threw the Egyptian forces into a panic, clogging their chariot wheels so that they drove heavily. And the Egyptians said, "Let us flee from before Israel, for the LORD fights for them against the Egyptians."

Then the LORD said to Moses, "Stretch out your hand over the sea, that the water may come back upon the Egyptians, upon their chariots,

and upon their horsemen." So Moses stretched out his hand over the sea, and the sea returned to its normal course when the morning appeared. And as the Egyptians fled into it, the LORD threw the Egyptians into the midst of the sea. The waters returned and covered the chariots and the horsemen; of all the host of Pharaoh that had followed them into the sea, not one of them remained. But the people of Israel walked on dry ground through the sea, the waters being a wall to them on their right hand and on their left.

Thus the LORD saved Israel that day from the hand of the Egyptians, and Israel saw the Egyptians dead on the seashore. Israel saw the great power that the LORD used against the Egyptians, so the people feared the LORD, and they believed in the LORD and in his servant Moses

Then Moses and the people of Israel sang this song to the LORD, saying,

"I will sing to the LORD, for he has triumphed gloriously; the horse and his rider he has thrown into the sea.

The Second Reading is 1 Corinthians 15:1-11

Now I would remind you, brothers, of the gospel I preached to you, which you received, in which you stand, and by which you are being saved, if you hold fast to the word I preached to you—unless you believed in vain.

For I delivered to you as of first importance what I also received: that Christ died for our sins in accordance with the Scriptures, that he was buried, that he was raised on the third day in accordance with the Scriptures, and that he appeared to Cephas, then to the twelve. Then he appeared to more than five hundred brothers at one time, most of whom are still alive, though some have fallen asleep. Then he appeared to James, then to all the apostles. Last of all, as to one untimely born, he appeared also to me. For I am the least of the apostles, unworthy to be called an apostle, because I persecuted the church of God. But by the grace of God I am what I am, and his grace toward me was not in vain. On the contrary, I worked harder than any of them, though it was not I, but the grace of God that is with me. Whether then it was I or they, so we preach and so you believed.

The Third Reading is John 20:1-18

Now on the first day of the week Mary Magdalene came to the tomb early, while it was still dark, and saw that the stone had been taken away from the tomb. So she ran and went to Simon Peter and the

other disciple, the one whom Jesus loved, and said to them, "They have taken the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid him." So Peter went out with the other disciple, and they were going toward the tomb. Both of them were running together, but the other disciple outran Peter and reached the tomb first. And stooping to look in, he saw the linen cloths lying there, but he did not go in. Then Simon Peter came, following him, and went into the tomb. He saw the linen cloths lying there, and the face cloth, which had been on Jesus' head, not lying with the linen cloths but folded up in a place by itself. Then the other disciple, who had reached the tomb first, also went in, and he saw and believed; for as yet they did not understand the Scripture, that he must rise from the dead. Then the disciples went back to their homes.

But Mary stood weeping outside the tomb, and as she wept she stooped to look into the tomb. And she saw two angels in white, sitting where the body of Jesus had lain, one at the head and one at the feet. They said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping?" She said to them, "They have taken away my Lord, and I do not know where they have laid him." Having said this, she turned around and saw Jesus standing, but she did not know that it was Jesus. Jesus said to her, "Woman, why are you weeping? Whom are you seeking?" Supposing him to be the gardener, she said to him, "Sir, if you have carried him away, tell me where vou have laid him, and I will take him away." Jesus said to her, "Mary." She turned and said to him in Aramaic, "Rabboni!" (which means Teacher). Jesus said to her, "Do not cling to me, for I have not yet ascended to the Father; but go to my brothers and say to them, 'I am ascending to my Father and your Father, to my God and your God." Mary Magdalene went and announced to the disciples, "I have seen the Lord"—and that he had said these things to her.

EDUCATION HOUR There are no Christian Education classes today. There is an Easter Breakfast after the Sunrise Matins and an Easter egg hunt after the Festival Divine Service for children grade 4 and younger. Next Sunday, Dr. Voelz will resume with the Gospel according to St. Mark, and Sunday school too.

TODAY is the Feast of Feasts in the Christian Church, the Celebration of the Resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. English-speaking countries call it Easter. On Friday, we remembered Jesus' death and burial. On Saturday, we rested as Jesus rested in the tomb (Saturday evening, which begins the third day, was our opening celebration of Jesus' resurrection — we don't know the exact time of His resurrection). And today, like the women who visited the tomb early on the first day of the week, we celebrate Jesus rising from the dead in eruptions of joy, exclamations of "Christ is risen," and shouts of "Alleluia!" Jesus rose from the dead, just as He said He would. "Alleluia!" But Easter is more than a day. Liturgically, it is a season, a week of weeks. Today our altar is adorned in gold, and for six more weeks the color is white. But Easter is more even than a season of the Church year. It is the ongoing reality in which we Christians live. We are Easter people who live in the hope of resurrection and life through faith in Christ Jesus. Indeed, every Sunday is a first day of the week; every Sunday is a little Easter, a celebration of resurrection victory in Christ Jesus. Every Sunday, and especially Easter, is our day!

What Doctor Luther Says:

About the Greatness of Jesus and His Resurrection

- 12. We must esteem this person in the highest. For if he is mighty, so must also the resurrection which he experienced be great. Christ is true God and true man, the true Son of God and of the Virgin greater than heaven and earth. ... When now a Christian comprehends the greatness of the person, he will recognize the greatness of the fruit. How meager are sin, death, and the devil in contrast to Christ. Since Christ is greater than heaven and earth, mightier than sin, death, and the devil, it therefore stands to reason that everything, all he suffers and does, is of paramount importance. Mighty was his suffering; mighty, too, was his resurrection from the dead.
- 13. This, then, is the lofty subject about which we ever and again preach and which you should diligently note and always remember. Few there are who really preach about this subject correctly; fewer still who learn and comprehend it. Then, too, there are the factious spirits who argue learnedly and critically about these events and ultimately destroy their significance by losing his person. They preach about Christ as just another prophet and allude to him as a mere visionary and cry: Apparition, apparition! In this way they cloud over these events and end by despising them and losing this noble person. Certainly this person is entirely different from all other prophets and these events are no ordinary history, ...; rather, it is the truly wonderful account of the glorious victory of Christ the Lord over sin, death, the devil, and hell.


