
RECEIVING OF THE LORD'S SUPPER AT ZION

As intended by Christ and as practiced by the one, holy, catholic and apostolic church throughout her history, "Closed Communion" is observed in this congregation, in which the Lord's Supper is distributed only to those:

- who have been baptized in the Name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit,
- who have been instructed in the truth of Holy Scripture as taught in the Lutheran Confessions, who have been confirmed (b) in this Lutheran faith, and who now confess the same doctrines that are taught in this congregation, holding membership in a congregation of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod;
- who believe that in this sacrament the real body and blood of Christ are truly distributed to them and orally received (c) by them, bestowing on them the forgiveness of sins, life and salvation;
- (d) who sincerely repent of all their sins, and desire to receive God's forgiveness in this holy meal.

Guests at our services, before receiving the sacrament, are requested to affirm these facts with one of our pastors. Thank you for honoring our practice. The Old Testament Reading is Proverbs 9:1-10

Wisdom has built her house;

she has hewn her seven pillars.

She has slaughtered her beasts; she has mixed her wine;

she has also set her table.

She has sent out her young women to call

from the highest places in the town,

"Whoever is simple, let him turn in here!"

To him who lacks sense she says,

"Come, eat of my bread

and drink of the wine I have mixed.

Leave your simple ways, and live,

and walk in the way of insight."

Whoever corrects a scoffer gets himself abuse,

and he who reproves a wicked man incurs injury.

Do not reprove a scoffer, or he will hate you;

reprove a wise man, and he will love you.

Give instruction to a wise man, and he will be still wiser; teach a righteous man, and he will increase in learning.

The fear of the LORD is the beginning of wisdom, and the knowledge of the Holy One is insight.

The Epistle is Ephesians 5:6-21

Let no one deceive you with empty words, for because of these things the wrath of God comes upon the sons of disobedience. Therefore do not associate with them; for at one time you were darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Walk as children of light (for the fruit of light is found in all that is good and right and true), and try to discern what is pleasing to the Lord. Take no part in the unfruitful works of darkness, but instead expose them. For it is shameful even to speak of the things that they do in secret. But when anything is exposed by the light, it becomes visible, for anything that becomes visible is light. Therefore it says,

"Awake, O sleeper, and arise from the dead, and Christ will shine on you."

Look carefully then how you walk, not as unwise but as wise, making the best use of the time, because the days are evil. Therefore do

not be foolish, but understand what the will of the Lord is. And do not get drunk with wine, for that is debauchery, but be filled with the Spirit, addressing one another in psalms and hymns and spiritual songs, singing and making melody to the Lord with all your heart, giving thanks always and for everything to God the Father in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, submitting to one another out of reverence for Christ

The Gospel is John 6:51-69

[Jesus said,] "I am the living bread that came down from heaven. If anyone eats of this bread, he will live forever. And the bread that I will give for the life of the world is my flesh."

The Jews then disputed among themselves, saying, "How can this man give us his flesh to eat?" So Jesus said to them, "Truly, truly, I say to you, unless you eat the flesh of the Son of Man and drink his blood, you have no life in you. Whoever feeds on my flesh and drinks my blood has eternal life, and I will raise him up on the last day. For my flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink. Whoever feeds on my flesh and drinks my blood abides in me, and I in him. As the living Father sent me, and I live because of the Father, so whoever feeds on me, he also will live because of me. This is the bread that came down from heaven, not as the fathers ate and died. Whoever feeds on this bread will live forever." Jesus said these things in the synagogue, as he taught at Capernaum.

When many of his disciples heard it, they said, "This is a hard saying; who can listen to it?" But Jesus, knowing in himself that his disciples were grumbling about this, said to them, "Do you take offense at this? Then what if you were to see the Son of Man ascending to where he was before? It is the Spirit who gives life; the flesh is of no avail. The words that I have spoken to you are spirit and life. But there are some of you who do not believe." (For Jesus knew from the beginning who those were who did not believe, and who it was who would betray him.) And he said, "This is why I told you that no one can come to me unless it is granted him by the Father."

After this many of his disciples turned back and no longer walked with him. So Jesus said to the Twelve, "Do you want to go away as well?" Simon Peter answered him, "Lord, to whom shall we go? You have the words of eternal life, and we have believed, and have come to know, that you are the Holy One of God."



What Doctor Luther Says:

About the Highest Wisdom, the Fear of God

Moses is telling us [in Ps. 90:12], as it were: "This life is of such a nature that it does not permit us to stand idly by and do nothing. It rather compels us to move about, that is, to be actively engaged either in the home or in community affairs." Therefore he is really saying: "God, grant us grace that we may wisely meet our responsibilities, that is, that we may perform them in humility and in Thy fear, ever mindful that because of our sin we are subject to Thy wrath."

We do not belong to society's dregs, who neither know the truth nor are really concerned about life and death, who only feed their bellies and seek recognition and power. These people go about their tasks in utter contempt of an incensed God. They are concerned neither about His grace nor about His wrath, and so they spend their lives in indescribable folly and stupor.

Therefore, O God, preserve us in the wisdom Thou hast taught us, that is, preserve us in Thy fear. For the "beginning of wisdom" (Prov. 9:10), or the highest wisdom, is the "fear of God," to know God's wrath and, as a result, to live and to perform everything we do with humble hearts.

Scripture thus exalts the fear of God. It impresses on men so to live that they fear God's wrath at all times and feel that they have merited death. This is the first element of salvation, when, because of sin, we see no deliverance. This is the highest wisdom: to go about our tasks in full awareness of God's wrath. In this way we are made ready, like the earth for the plow, to receive the divine seed, the fruit of which is eternal life.

Summary of meeting of the Council of Elders, August 1, 2024 (The following summary is being provided in accordance with the congregation's bylaws, §VIII)

(Note: there was no meeting of the council held in July.)

Attendance:

Elders present: R. Lammert (chairman), A. Litke (secretary), F.

Jacckson, W. Krause, K. Vlot.

Elder absent: T. Muehl. Pastor present: Pr. Punke.

Pastor Punke led the elders in a devotion by continuing the reading of Article IV on justification from the Apology of the Augsburg Confession.

In his pastor's report, Pastor Punke reported on deaths, matters of health, and other issues of members and friends of Zion, as well as activities at LSUS and CLHS (both about ready to begin their new school years). Pastor reported that he had examined Jaxon Meyer, who had been catechized at Emmaus Lutheran Church, in preparation for confirming him on August 4. The three junior confirmands (Kendall Burkhart, Nevaeh Holiday, and Braelyn Scott) are nearing the completion of their catechesis, and will soon be ready for examination and confirmation

The elders considered Pillar 1, Goal #1: "Starting July 1, 2024, Zion will experience a 10% increase in average worship attendance by September 30, 2024." The elders updated the goal to cover the current quarter of the calendar year; and Pastor Punke presented his telephone script for contacting members who had missed four consecutive weeks of worship. The elders should be able to start using this to contact members starting next month.

The elders reviewed Pillar 2, Goal #1: "In January of 2024, Zion will commence an annual opportunity for providing resources and training for members to gain confidence in inviting neighbors to Zion." This goal is on hold until September 2024.

The elders took a renewed look at Pillar 2, Goal #3: "Starting October 1, Zion will have a quarterly non-Communion worship service (elders determine strategies, timetable, location, etc.)."

The elders took into the consideration a suggestion made in the Aspirational Targets document to consider refocusing the goal on a "seeker Bible study." The elders considered that this would be a possibility for providing an entry point for prospective members and new members. The elders changed the goal to read: "By the end of 2024, Zion will develop a seeker Bible study for interested nonmembers and new members." Since the goal now relates to Bible studies, the goal was reassigned to the Education Council.

The elders reviewed Pillar 2, Goal #4: "The Council of Elders will work with all the other leaders of Zion to investigate the possibility of using *re:Vitality* as a program of institutional outreach at the church, deciding by July 31, 2024, whether to pursue its use." The elders and the Administrative council have decided to move forward with this goal. The elders will work with the Stewardship Committee to include the assessment tool, the first part of the *re:Vitality* program, with the stewardship drive in the fall.

The council began reviewing the manual for the Pastoral Support and Assistance Committee, but did not finish.

Frank Jackson reported that training for those interested in AED and CPR training is in the process of being worked out.

Elections for officers of the Council of Elders was held. Richard Lammert was elected as chairman, and Art Litke was elected as secretary.

The meeting was concluded with the Apostolic Blessing by Pastor Punke.

On June 5, Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod (LCMS) President Rev. Dr. Matthew C. Harrison wrote a pastoral letter to the Board of Regents of Concordia University Wisconsin and Ann Arbor (CUWAA). The full text of the letter is now being made publicly available.

Commemoration of Boniface of Mainz, Missionary to the Germans, A.D. 2024

June 5, 2024

Dear Regents,

Grace and peace in Jesus.

I want to share a few thoughts as you move forward with the challenges of the Ann Arbor (AA) question. Forgive the lack of formality in this missive. I'm in Iowa tending to my elderly parents this week.

First, I am totally sympathetic to the Michigan District's shock and concern over the future of the Ann Arbor campus. To be informed that an institution with record enrollment is not viable as currently constituted was a terrible and disappointing revelation. Their skepticism is completely understandable. And to be fair, the rollout of the information could have been done differently. But these are matters of the law, and such matters can always be critiqued. None of us is Jesus.

Second, I had our CFO evaluate the numbers, in consultation with some of the best financial minds in the CUS system. He concluded that the financial challenge to both institutions is very real, and strong measures are required to guarantee the future.

Third, I recognize after speaking at some length with Dr. Ankerberg that there are philosophical issues/differences on the nature of sustainable Lutheran education at AA.

Fourth, I acknowledge that CUW/AA leadership have been sorely and publicly slandered in a way that caused deep pain and offense. And most of that slander has, honorably, remained unanswered.

Fifth, in spite of all this, it is my continued plea that AA not be closed, that as many programs as possible be retained at the AA campus, and that the campus be maintained, looking toward future growth. This has been my consistent plea with CUW/AA leadership.

I have tried not to meddle. I did seek a consultation with Concordia, St. Paul, but with the approval of Dr. Ankerberg. I know that the responsibilities in this matter are squarely in the hands of the Board of Regents.

It is my sincere prayer that in this challenging situation the Lord will bless in a way that is finally a great benefit to CUW/AA and our beloved Michigan District, which is so vital and important to the life of the Synod.


