- (a) who have been baptized in the Name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit;
- (b) who have been instructed in the truth of Holy Scripture as taught in the Lutheran Confessions, who have been confirmed in this Lutheran faith, and who now confess the same doctrines that are taught in this congregation, holding membership in a congregation of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod;
- who believe that in this sacrament the real body and blood of Christ are truly distributed to them and orally received by them, bestowing on them the forgiveness of sins, life and salvation;
- (d) who sincerely repent of all their sins, and desire to receive God's forgiveness in this holy meal.

Guests at our services, before receiving the sacrament, are requested to affirm these facts with one of our pastors. Thank you for honoring our practice. Readings for the Sixth Sunday after Pentecost

The Old Testament Reading is Lamentations 3:22-33

The steadfast love of the LORD never ceases: his mercies never come to an end: they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness. "The LORD is my portion," says my soul, "therefore I will hope in him." The LORD is good to those who wait for him, to the soul who seeks him. It is good that one should wait quietly for the salvation of the LORD. It is good for a man that he bear the yoke in his youth. Let him sit alone in silence when it is laid on him; let him put his mouth in the dust—there may yet be hope; let him give his cheek to the one who strikes, and let him be filled with insults. For the Lord will not cast off forever but, though he cause grief, he will have compassion according to the abundance of his steadfast love; for he does not afflict from his heart or grieve the children of men.

The Epistle is 2 Corinthians 8:1-9, 13-15

We want you to know, brothers, about the grace of God that has been given among the churches of Macedonia, for in a severe test of affliction, their abundance of joy and their extreme poverty have overflowed in a wealth of generosity on their part. For they gave according to their means, as I can testify, and beyond their means, of their own free will, begging us earnestly for the favor of taking part in the relief of the saints—and this, not as we expected, but they gave themselves first to the Lord and then by the will of God to us. Accordingly, we urged Titus that as he had started, so he should complete among you this act of grace. But as you excel in everything—in faith, in speech, in knowledge, in all earnestness, and in our love for you—see that you excel in this act of grace also.

I say this not as a command, but to prove by the earnestness of others that your love also is genuine. For you know the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, that though he was rich, yet for your sake he became poor, so that you by his poverty might become rich. ...

I do not mean that others should be eased and you burdened, but that as a matter of fairness your abundance at the present time should supply their need, so that their abundance may supply your need, that there may be fairness. As it is written, "Whoever gathered much had nothing left over, and whoever gathered little had no lack."

The Gospel is Mark 5:21-43

When Jesus had crossed again in the boat to the other side, a great crowd gathered about him, and he was beside the sea. Then came one of the rulers of the synagogue, Jairus by name, and seeing him, he fell at his feet and implored him earnestly, saying, "My little daughter is at the point of death. Come and lay your hands on her, so that she may be made well and live." And he went with him.

And a great crowd followed him and thronged about him. And there was a woman who had had a discharge of blood for twelve years, and who had suffered much under many physicians, and had spent all that she had, and was no better but rather grew worse. She had heard the reports about Jesus and came up behind him in the crowd and touched his garment. For she said, "If I touch even his garments, I will be made well." And immediately the flow of blood dried up, and she felt in her body that she was healed of her disease. And Jesus, perceiving in himself that power had gone out from him, immediately turned about in the crowd and said, "Who touched my garments?" And his disciples said to him, "You see the crowd pressing around you, and yet you say, 'Who touched me?' " And he looked around to see who had done it. But the woman, knowing what had happened to her, came in fear and trembling and fell down before him and told him the whole truth. And he said to her, "Daughter, your faith has made you well; go in peace, and be healed of your disease."

While he was still speaking, there came from the ruler's house some who said, "Your daughter is dead. Why trouble the Teacher any further?" But overhearing what they said, Jesus said to the ruler of the synagogue, "Do not fear, only believe." And he allowed no one to follow him except Peter and James and John the brother of James. They came to the house of the ruler of the synagogue, and Jesus saw a commotion, people weeping and wailing loudly. And when he had entered, he said to them, "Why are you making a commotion and weeping? The child is not dead but sleeping." And they laughed at him. But he put them all outside and took the child's father and mother and those who were with him and went in where the child was. Taking her by the hand he said to her, "Talitha cumi," which means, "Little girl, I say to you, arise." And immediately the girl got up and began walking (for she was twelve years of age), and they were immediately overcome with amazement. And he strictly charged them that no one should know this, and told them to give her something to eat.

What Doctor Luther Says:

About Our Help When Evil Befalls Us

[N]o man is safe from the evils that befall any other, for what one has suffered another may also suffer. This applies to all the historic events and tragedies of all ages and to all the lamentations of the world. This applies also to the more than three hundred diseases which have been observed and with which the human body can be afflicted. And if there are that many diseases, how great do you think will be the number of the misfortunes that assail our possessions, our friends, and even our very mind, which, after all, is the main target of all evils and the one trysting place of sorrow and every ill?

These evils increase in power and intensity as a man rises to higher dignity and rank. Since misery, shame, and indignity can suddenly overtake a man of such an exalted estate, he must at all times be in dread of these evils, for they all hang by but a slender thread, like the sword which the tyrant Dionysius suspended above the head of his guest at his table.

If none of these evils befalls us, we should consider this a gain and no small comfort in the evil that does in fact become our lot, and exclaim with Jeremiah, "It is of the Lord's mercies that we are not consumed" [Lam. 3:22]. When none of these things happens to us it is because the preventing right hand of the Most High surrounds us on all sides with great might and like a wall (as is seen in the case of Job), so that Satan and the evils in their frustration can only be grievously vexed. From this we see how dearly we should love God whenever some evil afflicts us, for by that one evil our most loving Father would want us to see how many evils would threaten and attack us if he himself did not stand in the way. Luther's Works, 42:128-9.

Summary of meeting of the Council of Elders, June 13, 2024 (The following summary is being provided in accordance with the congregation's bylaws, §VIII)

Attendance:

Elders present: R. Lammert (chairman), A. Litke (secretary), F. Jackson. T. Muehl (via telephone), W. Krause.

Elder absent: B. Scott, K. Vlot

Pastor present: Pr. Punke.

Pastor Punke led the elders in a devotion by continuing the reading of Article IV on justification from the Apology of the Augsburg Confession.

In his pastor's report, Pastor Punke reported on deaths, matters of health, and other issues of members and friends of Zion. Of particular note is the confirmation of Melvia Culpher on June 9; a new class of adult catechumens (with three people expected) should begin soon. Also of note are the pastors-elect to whom the congregation has bid (or will bid) farewell: Eric Saunders and his family; Joseph Greenmyer and his family; Christopher Warneke and his wife. Zion also bid farewell to Paul and Courtney Mroczenski as Paul prepares for vicarage; they need to do fundraising for their missionary vicarage and desire to do a presentation at Zion. Pastor Punke also reported on items of interest from LSUS and CLHS.

The elders considered Pillar 1, Goal #1: "Starting April 1, 2024, Zion will experience a 10% increase in average worship attendance by June 30, 2024." Pastor Punke continues to work on a phone script for contacts with people who are absent from worship for four consecutive weeks.

The elders reviewed Pillar 2, Goal #1: "In January of 2024, Zion will commence an annual opportunity for providing resources and training for members to gain confidence in inviting neighbors to Zion." After the initial training offered in January

and February of this year, further work on this goal remains on hold until September 2024.

The elders reviewed Pillar 2, Goal #4: "The Council of Elders will work with all the other leaders of Zion to investigate the possibility of using *re:Vitality* as a program of institutional outreach at the church, deciding by July 31, 2024, whether to pursue its use." Richard Lammert reported that he had presented an overview of the program to the Administrative Council at their last meeting. Frank Jackson had similarly presented an overview to the ushers, who were supportive of the use of the program at Zion.

The elders reviewed the ushers' manual prepared by the Worship Practice and Assistance Committee under the chairmanship of Frank Jackson. The manual was approved by the elders on a voice vote. The manual will now be available from the secretary of the congregational assembly to any member of the congregation, as per Zion By-law XIV.C.

Frank Jackson reported on the pending installation of the AEDs and the CPR training.

The elders and Pastor Punke talked through the changes needed in preparation for conducting the Divine Service in Bauer Hall when the planned renovation of the ceiling and flooring of the sanctuary takes place.

The elders approved the proposal for the salaries of Pastor Punke, Michael Hollman, and Melvia Culpher, which will be submitted to the Administrative Council for inclusion in the proposed budget for the congregational assembly on July 28.

The meeting was concluded with the Apostolic Blessing by Richard Lammert.

Newly released data from the S.C. Department of Health and Environmental Control shows abortions occurring in South Carolina declined by about 80 percent once the protective Fetal Heartbeat Act became legally effective. "These are our little neighbors who have heartbeats —the most basic manifestation of human life ... The 80% reduction of abortions in South Carolina is a stark reminder that public policy saves lives ... May this be a reminder that lifesaving legislation requires policymakers' commitment to the lives of the unborn. May it remind us again that elections have consequences especially for life," said South Carolina Citizens for Life President Lisa Van Riper. During the first eight months of 2023 when abortion giant Planned Parenthood was fighting the law, DHEC statistics show an average of 954 abortions occurred every month in the three state-regulated abortion facilities, including Planned Parenthood centers in Columbia and Charleston and a privately owned abortion business in Greenville. Once the State Supreme Court upheld the Heartbeat law, allowing it to take effect on August 23, 2023, the number of abortions dropped to about 186 per month, DHEC data shows. 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A Lament for the Church

Fellow Christian Lutherans, consider the importance of lament in our lives. The fact that we, as Christians, are called to be faithful to Christ and His Word means that we call out to Him in **every** situation, including deep despair and anger. This is living under the first and second commandments and part of our prayer life as we pray the first petition of the Lord's Prayer, "Hallowed be Thy name."

Now let us look at a psalm which is a lament for the Church. Psalm 10 (which also can be placed under the second commandment and the first petition of the Lord's Prayer) laments over the enemies of the Church. Who are those enemies? Make no mistake: They are the devil and all those who follow his ways. Now open up your Bibles, everyone, and look at Psalm 10.

Verse one starts out with a question that we often ask: Why does it seem that God is far off, hiding in times of trouble? This is an oft-asked question. It is seen many times in Scripture. This is comforting because it tells us that it is okay to question, to express disappointment or frustration. The truth is that He isn't far off; perhaps He is hiding, but as we have discussed before, God has His ways and reasons for doing things that we cannot always understand. We are, after all, creatures, not the Creator. Again, I reiterate that it is desirable to the Lord that we ask, even if we don't get an answer.

The following ten verses speak of the wicked and their boasting, arrogant, greedy, and oppressive ways toward the poor, the innocent, and the helpless. The wicked say in their heart, "There is no God," or "God has forgotten, He doesn't see me." This is the self-justification mode kicking in. "Since God doesn't exist, or even if He did," we say, "He's not looking at anything I do. I can do whatever I please in order to gain for myself." Not only the devil plays a part in this, but even our own Old Adams sink to low levels. Look at verse two where the psalmist says, "Let them be caught in the schemes that they have devised." This is a prayer in which we ask God to fulfill His promise to make sure the unjust get their due rewards.

Verse twelve picks up again the prayer that God will see to it. "Arise, O Lord; O God, lift up your hand; forget not the afflicted." It continues with the comfort that the Lord will hear, will act, and will give strength to the poor and afflicted Church. He will not let His Church die. We are His bride, and He is the perfect Husband.

Take heart and have hope, God's people! Even though it appears as though we have been abandoned, that our existence here seems innocuous, not making a difference to our communities, we are not those things. God is not done with us yet. He only asks that we remain faithful because He is ALWAYS faithful. So, pray the lament of Psalm 10 and rejoice!
