As intended by Christ and as practiced by the one, holy, catholic and apostolic church throughout her history, "Closed Communion" is observed in this congregation, in which the Lord's Supper is distributed only to those: (a) who have been **baptized** in the Name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit;

- (b) who have been **instructed** in the truth of Holy Scripture as taught in the Lutheran Confessions, who have been **confirmed** in this Lutheran faith, and who now confess the same doctrines that are taught in this congregation, holding membership in a congregation of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod;
- (c) who believe that in this sacrament the real body and blood of Christ are truly distributed to them and orally received by them, bestowing on them the forgiveness of sins, life and salvation;

(d) who sincerely repent of all their sins, and desire to receive God's forgiveness in this holy meal. Guests at our services, before receiving the sacrament, are requested to affirm these facts with one of our pastors. Thank you for honoring our practice. If you are looking for a church home, would like to be a member of Zion, or would like to learn more about the Christian Faith, please speak to one of our pastors about our membership classes.




The Office of Confession of Sins and Absolution

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Readings for the Fourth Sunday in Lent

The Old Testament Reading is Isaiah 12:1-6

You will say in that day: "I will give thanks to you, O LORD, for though you were angry with me, your anger turned away, that you might comfort me. "Behold, God is my salvation; I will trust, and will not be afraid; for the LORD GOD is my strength and my song, and he has become my salvation." With joy you will draw water from the wells of salvation. And you will say in that day: "Give thanks to the LORD, call upon his name, make known his deeds among the peoples. proclaim that his name is exalted. "Sing praises to the LORD, for he has done gloriously; let this be made known in all the earth Shout, and sing for joy, O inhabitant of Zion, for great in your midst is the Holy One of Israel."

The Epistle is 2 Corinthians 5:16-21

From now on, therefore, we regard no one according to the flesh. Even though we once regarded Christ according to the flesh, we regard him thus no longer. Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation. The old has passed away; behold, the new has come. All this is from God, who through Christ reconciled us to himself and gave us the ministry of reconciliation; that is, in Christ God was reconciling the world to himself, not counting their trespasses against them, and entrusting to us the message of reconciliation. Therefore, we are ambassadors for Christ, God making his appeal through us. We implore you on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.

The Gospel is Luke 15:1-3, 11-32

Now the tax collectors and sinners were all drawing near to hear [Jesus]. And the Pharisees and the scribes grumbled, saying, "This man receives sinners and eats with them."

So he told them this parable: ...

"There was a man who had two sons. And the younger of them said to his father, 'Father, give me the share of property that is coming to me.' And he divided his property between them. Not many days later, the younger son gathered all he had and took a journey into a far country, and there he squandered his property in reckless living. And when he had spent everything, a severe famine arose in that country, and he began to be in need. So he went and hired himself out to one of the citizens of that country, who sent him into his fields to feed pigs. And he was longing to be fed with the pods that the pigs ate, and no one gave him anything.

"But when he came to himself, he said, 'How many of my father's hired servants have more than enough bread, but I perish here with hunger! I will arise and go to my father, and I will say to him, "Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you. I am no longer worthy to be called your son. Treat me as one of your hired servants." And he arose and came to his father. But while he was still a long way off, his father saw him and felt compassion, and ran and embraced him and kissed him. And the son said to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you. I am no longer worthy to be called your son.'

"But the father said to his servants, 'Bring quickly the best robe, and put it on him, and put a ring on his hand, and shoes on his feet. And bring the fattened calf and kill it, and let us eat and celebrate. For this my son was dead, and is alive again; he was lost, and is found.' And they began to celebrate.

"Now his older son was in the field, and as he came and drew near to the house, he heard music and dancing. And he called one of the servants and asked what these things meant. And he said to him, 'Your brother has come, and your father has killed the fattened calf, because he has received him back safe and sound.' But he was angry and refused to go in. His father came out and entreated him, but he answered his father, 'Look, these many years I have served you, and I never disobeyed your command, yet you never gave me a young goat, that I might celebrate with my friends. But when this son of yours came, who has devoured your property with prostitutes, you killed the fattened calf for him!' And he said to him, 'Son, you are always with me, and all that is mine is yours. It was fitting to celebrate and be glad, for this your brother was dead, and is alive; he was lost, and is found.'"

What Doctor Luther Says:

About Relying on God Alone and Praising Him

Note the fine, threefold summary of the psalmist [Psalm 118:14, a song echoed in Isaiah 12:2]: The Lord is "my Strength," "my Song," "my Salvation." The first indicates that he trusts wholly and completely in God, that God does, speaks, and quickens everything in him; and he will not boast of his own power, ability, knowledge, wisdom, holiness, or deeds. He will be nothing; in him God will be all and do all. ... He trusts and relies on no man or prince, on none of this world's power, wealth, friends, alliances, support, wisdom, deeds, comfort, or help. He trusts in God alone, in contrast to himself and all the world's might, wisdom, and holiness. This is expressed even more impressively in the song: God alone shall be his strength, trust, and defiance. Next, the psalmist cannot keep still about this. He turns it into a psalm and sings; he preaches, teaches, confesses, and declares what he believes about God. Faith cannot do otherwise; it always confesses what it believes (Rom. 10:10). The world cannot bear to hear that its power and wisdom, its holiness and piety, its counsel and deeds, are condemned and rejected, that the help and trust of men and princes should be cast out and despised, and their teaching be held vain and false. ... In the third place, God is his salvation and will not utterly abandon the singer and his song. God helps him in life and death and grants him victory. Though all the gates of hell and the whole world rage and rave, God, in the end, will be our salvation; we and our psalm and teaching shall survive, and all the adversaries shall founder. The Word of God abides forever. No amount of raging, blustering, blasphemy, or cursing will change this. Luther's Works, 14:77-78.

Summary of meeting of the Council of Elders, March 6, 2025 (The following summary is being provided in accordance with the congregation's bylaws, §VIII)

Attendance: Elders present: R. Lammert (chairman), A. Litke (secretary), F. Jackson, W. Krause, J. Teasdale. Elders absent: T. Muehl, K. Vlot. Pastor present: Pr. Punke.

Pastor Punke led the elders in a devotion by continuing the reading Article V of the Apology of the Augsburg Confession.

The Council of Elders welcomed Rev. James Teasdale as its newest member. Jim was appointed to fill the vacant 2024–2027 term.

In his pastor's report, Pastor Punke included updates on transfers in and out of the congregation, on the sick, on other issues among the members and friends of Zion, and on prospects for a new adult catechesis class. He also reported on his contacts with members who have recently become inactive, on the Erwin Brand Scholarship, on the Lutheran Schools Association, on LSUS, and on CLHS's capital campaign. Pastor Punke also noted that the beautification project is on schedule, and is still expected to be completed by Palm Sunday.

The elders reviewed Pillar 1, Goal #1: "Starting January 1, 2025, Zion will experience a 10% increase in average worship attendance by March 31, 2025." The elders will pursue this goal starting in its May meeting by developing strategies for contacting longer-term inactive members and ways to involve them again in the congregation.

The elders reviewed Pillar 2, Goal #1: "In January of 2025, Zion will commence an annual opportunity for providing resources and training for members to gain confidence in inviting neighbors to Zion." This goal is currently on hold; the elders will schedule another *Every One His Witness* workshop for the fall.

The elders reviewed Pillar 2, Goal #4: "The Council of Elders will conduct the CADDS survey before Lent 2025." In order to coordinate schedules with the synodical office that conducts the CADDS survey, Zion will conduct this survey from April 13

through May 4. The Congregational Assessment of Development/Decline Status (CADDS) survey is a tool developed by The Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod to survey congregational members and others who have a stake in the congregation. The survey is primarily an online tool (although we will provide a paper copy of the survey to anyone who is unable or unwilling to use an online form). The leadership of the congregation will use the results of the survey for future planning.

The elders continued to review the document of the Council of Elders on Communion Procedure. The council will finish the review in the April meeting.

The meeting was concluded with the praying of Responsive Prayer 1.




