RECEIVING OF THE LORD'S SUPPER AT ZION

As intended by Christ and as practiced by the one, holy, catholic and apostolic church throughout her history, "Closed Communion" is observed in this congregation, in which the Lord's Supper is distributed only to those:

- (a) who have been **baptized** in the Name of the Father, Son and Holy Spirit;
- (b) who have been **instructed** in the truth of Holy Scripture as taught in the Lutheran Confessions, who have been **confirmed** in this Lutheran faith, and who now confess the same doctrines that are taught in this congregation, holding membership in a congregation of the Lutheran Church-Missouri Synod;
- (c) who **believe that in this sacrament the real body and blood of Christ are truly distributed to them and orally received by them**, bestowing on them the forgiveness of sins, life and salvation;
- (d) who **sincerely repent** of all their sins, and desire to receive God's forgiveness in this holy meal.

Guests at our services, before receiving the sacrament, are requested to affirm these facts with one of our pastors. Thank you for honoring our practice. If you are looking for a church home, would like to be a member of Zion, or would like to learn more about the Christian Faith, please speak to one of our pastors about our membership classes.



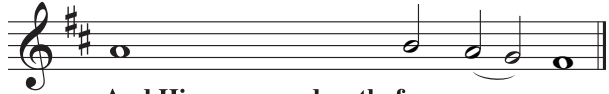

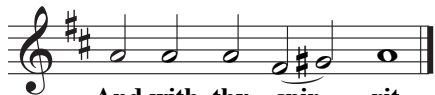

The Old Testament Reading is Isaiah 63:7-14

I will recount the steadfast love of the LORD,
the praises of the LORD,
according to all that the LORD has granted us,
and the great goodness to the house of Israel
that he has granted them according to his compassion,
according to the abundance of his steadfast love.

For he said, "Surely they are my people,

And because you are sons, God has sent the Spirit of his Son into our hearts, crying, “Abba! Father!” So you are no longer a slave, but a son, and if a son, then an heir through God.

Now when [the wise men] had departed, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared to Joseph in a dream and said, “Rise, take the child and his mother, and flee to Egypt, and remain there until I tell you, for Herod is about to search for the child, to destroy him.” And he rose and took the child and his mother by night and departed to Egypt and remained there until the death of Herod. This was to fulfill what the Lord had spoken by the prophet, “Out of Egypt I called my son.”

Then Herod, when he saw that he had been tricked by the wise men, became furious, and he sent and killed all the male children in Bethlehem and in all that region who were two years old or under, according to the time that he had ascertained from the wise men. Then was fulfilled what was spoken by the prophet Jeremiah:

“A voice was heard in Ramah,
weeping and loud lamentation,
Rachel weeping for her children;
she refused to be comforted, because they are no more.”

But when Herod died, behold, an angel of the Lord appeared in a dream to Joseph in Egypt, saying, “Rise, take the child and his mother and go to the land of Israel, for those who sought the child’s life are dead.” And he rose and took the child and his mother and went to the land of Israel. But when he heard that Archelaus was reigning over Judea in place of his father Herod, he was afraid to go there, and being warned in a dream he withdrew to the district of Galilee. And he went and lived in a city called Nazareth, that what was spoken by the prophets might be fulfilled: “He shall be called a Nazarene.”

What Doctor Luther Says:

About Merit—Excluded from Salvation, Not from Fruit

Regarding merit ... we say this. If the subject is what makes a Christian a Christian, how to become pious before God and obtain forgiveness of sins and eternal life, here we are all alike; here all our merit is completely excluded, and we must not hear or know anything about it. You have not merited the Gospel or Christ or Baptism, but it is purely a gift, freely given. Our sins are forgiven free, and we become God's children and are put into heaven without any contribution on our part. ...

Now, if we are discussing the fruit that follows grace and the forgiveness of sins, we will let the terms "merit" and "reward" be used. What we oppose is the idea that works of ours like these are the highest good, which must precede them and without which they do not take place or please God. If the insistence on grace alone without any merit is preserved, then we have no objection to giving the name "merits" to the fruit that follows. Only such statements should not be distorted and applied in an antisciptural way to our meriting grace, but interpreted correctly, the way they were intended, as a consolation to Christians — especially when they have to suffer opposition, when they get the feeling and the impression that our life, suffering, and activity are pointless and useless. This is the consolation that Scripture uses everywhere in urging perseverance in good works. So in Jeremiah 31:16 it says: "Your works shall be rewarded"; and St. Paul says in 1 Corinthians 15:58: "In the Lord your labor is not in vain."

Summary of meeting of the Council of Elders, Dec. 4, 2025
The following summary is being provided in accordance with
the congregation's bylaws, §VIII)

Attendance:

Elders present: R. Lammert (chairman), A. Litke (secretary),
J. Teasdale.

Elder absent: F. Jackson, W. Krause, T. Muehl.

Pastor present: Pr. Punke.

Pastor Punke led the elders in a devotion by continuing the
reading of Article V of the Apology of the Augsburg Confession.

In his report Pastor Punke reported on a recent death and a
recent birth (and upcoming baptism) among Zion's members,
as well as family and health matters among members and
friends of the congregation. He discussed the Advent/Christmas
worship schedule and the work of our seminary
field workers. Pastor Punke gave updates on the work being
done in response to the lightning strike last spring and informed
the elders of current issues with the church's internet and
phones. He then reported on LSUS, CLHS, and on musical
events at Zion.

The elders reviewed Pillar 1, Goal #1: "In the current quarter
of the calendar year, Zion will experience a 10% increase in
average worship attendance over the same quarter of the
previous year." Because of the problems with the internet,
Pastor Punke could not retrieve statistics for the quarter to
date. The council will review the fourth quarter 2025 data
at the January meeting.

The elders reviewed Pillar 2, Goal #1: "The elders will
sponsor at least annually an opportunity for providing
resources and training for members to gain confidence in

inviting neighbors to Zion.” The six weekly sessions of the *Every One His Witness* workshop are scheduled for 2026, beginning on January 17, and ending on February 21, with Pastor Punke as the workshop leader.

The elders reviewed Pillar 2, Goal #4: “The Council of Elders will work through an ad-hoc committee with the Administrative Council and Education Council to determine whether to proceed and how to proceed to respond to the results of the CADDs survey, with a report by January 31, 2026.” The ad-hoc committee continues to work on their recommendations, expecting to finish by the end of January, 2026.

The elders began reviewing the congregational policy document *The Christian Funeral at Zion Lutheran Church, Fort Wayne, Indiana*. The review will continue at the next meeting.

The meeting was closed by praying Responsive Prayer 1.
